Clunbury Bellringers ~ an Audience with Barbara Freeman



A wet and overcast morning was cheered by chatting to Barbara Freeman (née Williams) over tea and muffins, at the lovely Upper House in Clunbury.

Barbara, a long-standing resident of Clunbury since her parents moved here in 1956, was keen to make the subject of her interview, bell-ringing - something very dear to her heart.

"Growing up in the village, there wasn't a great deal to do and most of it centred around the church. By the time I was 8 or 9, I was singing in the choir. Easter, Harvest Festival and Christmas were the three big events of the year. Farmers used to fill the church at Harvest Festival - the singing was fantastic! I was so exhilarated by it. There were some wonderful singers, like Dorothy Philips, Mrs Seabury and Avril and Rosemary Lane who sometimes sang solos. We had special anthems for Easter and Harvest Festival and sang carols at Christmas, instructed by Mr Harry Meredith.

Barbara laughs as she suddenly remembers something: "I loved the singing but I was pretty miffed when Stuart Seabury let the cat out of the bag one day and admitted the boys got a shilling for singing! It was more difficult to get boys to sing so they had to bribe them!"

So how did the bell-ringing come about, I asked.

"Well, it was really an offshoot of the choir and we were so lucky to have Mr Albert Lane and Mr Meredith and also the Rev. Royds to instruct us. We would practise on a Monday night - it was the only entertainment we had and we were lucky to have it. It was a sort of youth club for the local youngsters - the highlight of our week. A chance to have some fun, learn a new skill and chat with the boys!" she says with a twinkle.

"Once we'd learnt to master the bell, we learnt different call changes, bell-ringing methods and tunes; for example, Queens, Titums and Whittington. Because of Mr Lane's efforts, we were good enough to ring at weddings; such a thrill to be part of the ceremony!"

Barbara tells me I shouldn't write the next story but when I've heard it, I persuade her it isn't really too shocking! "When I was about 14, I went to ring at a wedding in Wistanstow. As it was mainly men ringers, they left a crate of beer for them as a thank you. Well! I had my first taste of brown ale! And I've never looked back!"

I asked her what was her most memorable bell-ringing experience (apart from the beer episode!)

"The highlight of the year was to ring on New Year's Eve. We used to go down to Rev. Royds' drawing room where he had a piano - we'd have squash and sing carols. The men all enjoyed a good drink and scaling the vertical ladder to the ringing chamber was a challenge, especially for the vicar! Let's just say, he was very tall and very broad and we often wondered if he'd make it up the ladder, let alone down again!

"Leading up to midnight, we'd ring very slowly - putting big spaces between the bells. Then, the clock would indicate it was midnight and we'd ring fast and furiously, non-stop, for 10 or 15 minutes. It was such an adrenaline kick!

"My biggest ambition is to teach my children, and any other local children, to ring, and then perhaps we'd be able to revive the New Year's Eve ringing."

And before those people living near the church start panicking, Barbara says the bells can be muffled when you're teaching so they don't clang too much!

"Now they've been re-hung, the bells are so much lighter and smoother to ring. And the beauty of ringing is you can ring anywhere and you will be welcomed everywhere. It's such a strong tradition and there's been a good revival locally."

Barbara wishes her childhood memories weren't just snippets; when you meet someone who also rang, the memories come flooding back, she said.

A big thank you, Barbara, for giving up your time, especially with poorly children at home, and I loved seeing all the old photos you'd unearthed.

The Flower Show was preceded by the Gooseberry Fair which started in 1815 but which fell from grace because of its reputation for being a drunken affair!

The Shrewsbury Flower Show is now organised by a committee of 40, working with 2 full time employees. It has always had an excellent reputation for the high standard of its amateur and commercial exhibits of flowers and vegetables but these days finds it necessary to provide celebrity attractions and various commercial stands to encourage a new audience.

The Flower Show has a major impact on the Shropshire tourist industry and supports many good causes such as the Hospice and a respite home for servicemen. It also provides a bursary for a horticultural student at Wisley and Pershore.

Get Geared up for a Mothering Sunday Treat (3 April) Make your own Barn Owl pellet truffles

Ingredients

250ml double cream
325g best quality chocolate chopped into even sized chunks
1/2 packet of finely crushed digestive biscuits
Cocoa powder, sifted
Dessicated coconut for covering



Method

1. In a heavy-based saucepan bring the cream up to simmering point.
2. Cut the chocolate into evenly sized chunks and place into a glass mixing bowl
3. Pour the simmered cream onto the chocolate and mix well until smooth and glossy.
4. Finely crush the digestive biscuits (wrap the biscuits in cling film and crush to fine crumbs with a rolling pin). Add the crushed biscuits to the chocolate mixture as required until mixture holds together.
4. Place in a cool place to cool and firm-up.
5. Once cooled, take teaspoons of the truffle mixture, roll into balls and dust with the ground cocoa powder and coconut.
6. Place aside to set.
