Remembrance Day 2012

Remembrance Day was very special and memorable for all those who were there, as it was Colonel Savill's twenty-fifth consecutive leading of our Clunbury service and he intends it to be his last. In his address Raymond reflected how this service has developed and grown during those twenty-five years and how it has evolved in tone since he first became actively involved after WWII. In the immediate post war days of continuing privations and with the pain of bereavement still raw, the mood was of revenge and retribution where few could find a positive thought about anything German, but today's services have a strong emphasis on reconciliation and peace. Back in 1988, Raymond inherited a 1946 standard service, and felt that much in it was no longer appropriate. So he gradually amended it until he arrived at what we have today, with its sharper focus on the ongoing development of peaceful relations with the world whilst still remembering those prepared to make the sacrifice to ensure that this would ultimately be so, which has paid dividends over the last sixty-five years in Western Europe. He also highlighted the continuing work of the Legion in caring for those who have been injured in conflict and for the widows and children of those lost. The service was well attended and we were pleased to have some uniformed members present to add that special touch to the service, some of whom assisted in the intercessions for peace.

Later the ceremony at the monument took place in time honoured fashion, this year led by Revd. Paul Wignall. This ceremony has become so well attended that the police were there to control the traffic whilst the Two Minutes Silence was observed on a still, beautifully crisp day with autumn's habitual chill in the air and the trees in their close of year finery. The children present reminded us that remembering the past is all about building



for their future. As I watched them play on the Hundred House lawn I was moved to give thanks for those who had ensured that they could still play happily and safely.

In closing, I would like to thank Raymond for his sterling commitment to this event over all those years, whilst also noting his contribution to leading Mattins over many years. Although he no longer does this on a regular basis, he led one on 14 October which was also a noteworthy occasion. I would like to echo Nick Matveieff's words to Raymond at the end of the service, thanking him for the excellent addresses he has given, not least of which the one on that occasion which examined the sin of pride of position and drew the point that Jesus' teachings are just as relevant and necessary today. Also, many thanks are due to all those who made these services possible.

Scandinavian birds make a showing

October and November has seen the arrival in force of Fieldfares and Redwings, thrushes from Scandinavia that are winter visitors to Britain and Ireland. You may have heard the Fieldfares flying overhead in loose flocks, 'chacking' to each other as they go, seeking out the best hawthorn bushes on which to feed. A little bigger than a Blackbird, they are handsome birds, with red-brown and grey plumage. Redwings are the size of Song Thrushes and similar in plumage but for a white stripe above the eye and a rusty-red patch on the underwing which extends onto the flank. Less vocal, their thin drawn-out 'seeep' calls can nevertheless be heard, even at night, as they move through the country.

In late October and early November there were sightings of single Bramblings at two bird tables in Kempton and more recently I have seen single birds at three locations near Obley, so this may turn out to be a good year for sightings of this other winter visitor from Scandinavia. In shape and size they strongly resemble Chaffinches but their beautiful tortoiseshell colours and prominent white rump are good distinguishing features.

And have you seen a Waxwing? Another visitor from northern Europe, this is a truly exotic looking bird with a prominent crest, reddish-buff colouring, black bib and a tail and wing edges that look as if they had been dipped in yellow sealing wax, with some red wax involved too - a real stunner. Several were spotted in Kempton on 25 November, so keep a good look out for them feeding on berry bushes and late-hanging apples in your gardens. Birds have been reported from Shrewsbury, Clun, Bishop's Castle and Ludlow, so it looks as though we are in for a 'Waxwing year'.

Fairtrade Clun Valley

Twenty people met on 15 November to hear about Fairtrade and local initiatives to apply for Fairtrade status for the Clun Valley. Ruth and John Anderson described Fairtrade in action in Ethiopia and their work in Bradford to establish Fairtrade certification there. Michael Whithouse explained the work of Land, Life and Livelihoods in the Upper Clun Valley, helping to make the links with local sourcing of food and sustainability. Helen Davies reported on the fantastic initiatives of the Green Dragons Committee at Clun School in gaining first an Eco award and their current application to be a Fairtrade School.

Jenny Barker outlined what needs to be done to promote the Clun Valley application and she reported that support from businesses, cafés and pubs, organisations and public bodies is growing. Supporters need only to pledge to provide 2 or more Fair Trade products. She emphasised the importance of networking in the local communities so that a list of people and services providing and using Fairtrade products can be built up.

Parish Council Meeting Notes

8 November, 2012 Kempton Village Hall
Present: eight councillors, the Parish Clerk, three members of the public.

Apologies: Cllr. John Croxton, Shropshire Cllr. Nigel Hartin

Bridleway at Ashbeds: Mr Sweetman alluded to the planning inspector's decision ordering Shropshire Council (SC) to add a Public Bridleway from Coppice Lane at Ashbeds to the edge of Purslow Wood, and had been informed that this would take at least a year. It is clear, however, from the appeal decision, that this order will not extend into Purslow Wood from where it abuts Ashbeds, as the public are only allowed to walk but not ride horses or bikes beyond this point. Discussions appear to be taking place between SC and the Forestry Commission to amend the line of the bridleway as shown on the Ordnance Survey map.

Three parishes meet to discuss SAMDev: Cllr Hill reported that Cllrs. Croxton, Bailey and himself had attended a meeting with councillors from Clungunford and Hopesay parishes and representatives from SC to discuss the SAMDev Plan and Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) There is still confusion about whether the Plan applies at parish level or to individual settlements, so it is still not clear where development may be permitted. Clungunford see CIL as a possible method of funding the completion of their Parish Hall. The SC representatives said that Parish Councils would have more control over new development in the future and that CIL money could be used to leverage funding for affordable housing. The meeting went some way to help clarify matters. It was agreed that another joint meeting would be held to discuss SC's Place Plans for our area.

Himalayan Balsam: Cllr Hill had looked at advice from the Environment Agency, who state that the plant dies back in the autumn, leaving river banks bare of vegetation and therefore liable to erosion. By fencing along the riverbank, livestock will be prevented from worsening this soil erosion into the water.

Clun Valley AED Scheme: Units will be fitted at Clunbury, Kempton and Purslow.

Planning: the agricultural building at Hurst Barn had been granted.

Clunton street lights: there were only 2 respondents to the invitation to comment on the switching off of the street lights at night - 1 for and 1 against. Cllrs were of the opinion that older people felt more secure with the lights on and in the absence of overriding support to turn them off, it was decided to maintain the status quo.

Potholes: Cllr Morgan reported many bad potholes in roads within the parish, and tracks in the woods are becoming impassable with deep ruts due to 4x4s, particularly citing the old Roman Road between the Cwm and Black Hill.

Hedge at Mallow Cottage, Twitchen: Cllr Morgan complimented the owners on work to the hedge abutting the road. Cllr Hill referred to the communication printed in the Parish Post from the owners, who were unhappy at not having been approached personally by members of the PC. Traffic was now speeding through Twitchen and SC had offered no support by way of traffic calming. Cllr Bailey will be speaking to SC and the MP again.

Byway at Bush Farm: There had recently been a Sponsored Ride which had been obstructed by a locked gate. There is a question mark as to whether a public bridleway exists throughout the entire length of the track running from Clunton Coppice to Bush Farm, and it appears the gate was locked to prevent 4x4s damaging the track. Cllrs will investigate the position.

Traffic speeding in Clunton: A letter had been received from a Clunton resident regarding the excessive speed of traffic through the village. Cllrs agreed to inform the police as there had been several complaints.

AOB: A Kempton resident reported there was a lot of mud on a particular road in Kempton, which potentially could block the drains and the Council were asked to refer the matter to the appropriate department at SC.
