Free 'River Workshop'

The Shropshire Hills AONB Partnership aims to create a splash on 13 February 2013 at The Hundred House Inn, Purslow, where farmers, land agents and contractors are invited to a free 'River Workshop' from 11am to 12.30pm, followed by lunch.

Mike Kelly, River Valleys Officer, said 'Various agencies have successfully worked with some landowners to improve the health of rivers in the Clun catchment, but more needs to be done. We are keen for attendees to help us identify new opportunities for land management that's sensitive to the needs of rivers in the area and so help meet targets of achieving crystal clear river water and species-rich banks'.

The workshop will be a unique opportunity to hear about managing riverside trees, and issues such as deadwood and tree diseases. Funding schemes will be explained, including the

SITA Freshwater Mussel Project and the Catchment Sensitive Farming initiative.

Speakers will include representatives from the Shropshire Hills AONB Partnership, the Environment Agency and Natural England.

Rivers in the Clun River Catchment include the Clun, Folly Brook, Redlake, Kemp, Unk, Hopton Brook and Mardu Brook, covering an area of 27043ha.

Parish Council Meeting Notes

17 January, 2013, Clunton Village Hall

Present: all councillors and 3 members of the public

County Council: Cllr Hartin updated the meeting about the situation. There had been changes to senior staff and the new Chief Executive is paid half of what his predecessor received. In respect of the Council's budget, significant savings had already been made but there was to be a further £9 million budget reduction in the coming financial year with additional cuts in the order of £30 million to £70 million running up to 2018 due to a continuing reduction in central government funding. The Council was aiming to maintain all services but budgets would have to be cut. Prospects were grim, with particular anxieties expressed about funding for village schools.

In answer to questions regarding the state of the roads, he explained that the Council had appointed a new Service Contractor (by competitive tender); there had been problems due to items being omitted from the original specification; these were being ironed out and things were improving. Gritting was only done on principal thoroughfares; however the Council has good reserves of salt and grit. Should some be required, ring 0345 678 9006.

Parish precept: This currently stands at £3,000, if this were to be reduced to £2,816, parishioners would pay no more for this small element of their Council Tax bill. However almost all the PC's costs were fixed and in view of this and the need to meet the cost of PC elections in May (likely to cost in the order of £600) it was decided to keep the precept unchanged, though when inflation was taken into account this amounted to a reduction in real terms.

Clun Valley AED scheme: the scheme was progressing nicely, with equipment installed in Clunton (with 6 people trained) and Purslow, and soon to be

installed in Kempton (with 17 people trained). Next training day will be on Sat 16 Feb, at the 'Scout Hut' (Green Room), Wistanstow.

Local Joint Committee: A meeting is planned on 14 Feb at Lydham Village Hall, with speakers covering topics such as affordable housing, benefit charges, getting back to work and grant applications (already greater than the money available).

Rights of way: *Bush Farm (Road):* access rights have been queried. The County Council is to be asked to define its status.

Flooding: *Stream at Field Lane, Clunton:* some councillors will have a site meeting to see what needs to be done regarding flooding.

Road Closures: *Clunbury:* 16 February for 8 days (completion of the installation of the mains)

Brockton to Lower Down: 18 March, 2 days (resurfacing).

Clunton speed limit: no news.

Septic tanks: the AONB has produced an information leaflet on the subject as part of the drive to improve water quality in the Clun. Leaflets will be available in village halls, or email

Burial ground at Clunton: a complaint had been to the effect that the access was difficult. Councillors pointed out that the route used was not a public right of way and access was permitted thanks to the goodwill of two landowners. The Clerk is to advise the complainant of this.

AOB: Cllr Morgan raised the question of the parish land at Black Hill (run by the charity: Clunbury Relief in Need). There may be a possibility to get some income from it, but it needs to be registered first. She will get the forms for registration.

Clunton Village Hall: Cllr Davies reported on the purchase of chairs with £385 from the millennium fund.

Next 2 meetings: 21 March, 8pm, Clunbury VH. 23 May, 8pm, Kempton VH.
