Clunbury School

When the school was asked if they had any questions for the Parish Plan Questionnaire, we could not think of any questions beyond those which were asked by others. However, the school considers that it is very much part of the Parish. I would like to take this opportunity to explain what Clunbury School does so well. The recent Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools said that Clunbury School was outstanding in all categories and the school and governors were delighted with this recognition of the hard work of all concerned with the school: pupils, staff, parents, carers and governors. This was a very rigorous inspection and shows the school, among other things, to have 'outstanding relationships between pupils and staff with the Christian values of trust and respect at their heart'. The children receive an excellent education and although we are a small country school the staff make sure that the children are part of the wider world.

Clunbury School is a voluntary aided school which means that the governing body have a duty to promote the Christian character of the school, although the school welcomes children of all faiths and none. Further, the governors have to provide 10% of any costs of building works funded by the Diocese. (The Nursery, although part of the school, is funded differently and the pupils in the nursery do not count towards the census taken in October). In order to maintain and add to the facilities that the school has to offer, the governors will have to do some serious fund raising. If you have any ideas in this direction we would be pleased to hear from you.

The school is funded, for the most part, by the local authority, and receives approximately £3,219 per child per school year, to cover all expenses: staffing, running costs, stationery, services, etc.

This money cannot be spent on upgrading the fabric of the buildings. Keeping within the budget is a serious matter and the Friends of Clunbury School provide some additional funds to pay for equipment and experiences.

Clunbury School wants to be part of the Parish and we want to continue to be an asset to the village. It will be obvious from my brief explanation of funding, that Clunbury School needs to attract parents and children and to provide for those children in the best way possible. The lack of affordable family housing in the village and its surrounds is a serious problem.

Decision on Disputed Bridleway

As a result of the Public Inquiry, which took place in Clunbury Village Hall on 22 September 2015, the Order, made in June 2014, to open the disputed bridleway at Ashbeds, Clunton, was upheld.

The Inspector, Heidi Cruickshank concluded that –

“Considering the evidence as a whole I am satisfied, on the balance of probabilities, that the Order route should be recorded as a public bridleway. The way has been used by the public on foot, horse and bicycle, as of right and without interruption in the twenty-year period 1986-2006...

Having regard to these and all other matters raised at the Inquiry, and in the written representations, I conclude that the Order should be confirmed.”

This is why there are so many strimming and bonfire casualties every year, not to mention those killed on the road or damaged by dog attacks.



Please check for hedgehogs before strimming or mowing and please check bonfires carefully for sleeping hedgehogs before lighting. If possible the entire pile should be re-sited before being lit. If this cannot be done, use broom handles to lift from the base of the pile and shine torches, looking and listening carefully for any signs of life.

CyberSmart

Beware of Scam Phone Calls

If someone posing as a retailer calls you to confirm an online purchase, it could well

Look After That Smartphone or Tablet:

Protect your smartphone or tablet by downloading a reputable internet security app and make sure it's safeguarded with a PIN. Install parental control software on kids' mobile devices and chat to them about how to use the internet safely.

Remember to Log Out: When you've finished your online shopping or banking session, always log out of the website. Sometimes, just closing the window doesn't mean you've logged out, and someone else could gain access to your account and personal details. Don't forget to check and save purchase confirmation emails.

Make Sure Wi-Fi is

Secure: Wherever you are, make sure the Wi-Fi is secured. When you're out, in the café, the pub or a hotel for example, you can't guarantee it's secured even if you have to enter a code. When you're shopping, banking or making other online payments, it's better to connect with 3G or 4G, even if it's slower.

be a scam. The idea is that you won't remember the purchase, and call your bank. However, the fraudster stays on the line, and tricks you into revealing your financial details. If this happens, hang up, don't call back, but report it to Action Fraud.

Check Bank Statements:

Check your bank and credit card accounts regularly for irregular or unauthorised transactions. If you spot any entries you don't recognise, contact your bank without delay. Make sure your bank has your up-to-date contact details so they can alert you if they spot anything unusual.
